
**BRIEF ON PAN AFRICAN DESIGN
DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE(PADDI)**

1. Background

The Pan African Design Development Initiative (PADDI) is an African design-based initiative made of consortium of organizations and institutions dedicated to promoting and supporting design and development initiatives across the African continent. PADDI aims to harness the power of design thinking and innovation to address social, economic and environmental challenges in Africa. The organization collaborates with various stakeholders including designers, creatives development partners, policymakers and communities to create sustainable solutions that improve the quality of life for people in Africa.

2. Mission and Objectives

PADDI's mission is to foster a culture of design thinking and innovation in Africa to drive sustainable development. This is to be achieved under **5 thematic objective areas**;

- i) Promotion of Design education and skills development across Africa, empowering individuals with the knowledge and tools to create impactful solutions.
- ii) Advocating for the integration of sustainable design principles in all aspects of development, emphasizing environmentally conscious practices and resource-efficient solutions.
- iii) Facilitation of collaborative projects that bring together diverse expertise to address pressing societal challenges.
- iv) Prioritizing community engagement and empowerment, recognizing the importance of local knowledge and participation in shaping development initiatives

3. Proposed Initiatives

- i) Conducting training programs aimed at nurturing design talent and fostering a culture of innovation.
- ii) Supporting research initiatives focused on identifying innovative design solutions tailored to the specific needs of African communities.
- iii) Engaging in advocacy efforts and design and implementation of macro-economic policies that support design-driven solutions to professionalize Design Profession in a sustainable development conscious environment

- iv) Collaborating with Governmental Agencies, Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs), Academic Institutions, Manufacturers, private sector entities, Regional and International organizations as well as other Global partners to implement impactful Design projects in African Countries.

4. Partnerships and Collaborations

Collaboration is central to PADDI's approach and the organization actively seeks partnerships with Governments, NGOs, businesses and International agencies to amplify its impact. By working with diverse stakeholders, PADDI leverages on resources, expertise and networks to implement impactful projects and initiatives across the continent

iii) Governments Role in the Realization of the Pan African Design Development Initiative

iv) Development Partners Support the Realization of the Pan African Design Development Initiative

Regional and international Development partners play a crucial role in supporting the realization of the Pan African Design Development Initiative. PADDI aims to promote design thinking, innovation and entrepreneurship across Africa, fostering economic growth and social development.

To effectively support PADDI, development partners can;

- a) Offer technical expertise and knowledge sharing in various design disciplines through workshops, training programs and mentorship opportunities.
- b) Provide financial assistance to Governments, Educational institutions, and Local organizations involved in PADDI.
- c) Support the development and implementation of policies that promote the integration of design thinking into curricula at all levels of education and encouraging public-private partnerships.
- d) Support the construction and maintenance of design centers, innovation hubs, and maker spaces across Africa. These facilities can serve as platforms for collaboration, experimentation, and the development of new products and services.
- e) Facilitate the establishment of networks and partnerships among African designers, design institutions, and international design communities to help create opportunities for collaboration, knowledge exchange and access to global markets.
- f) Invest in the development of human resources by providing scholarships, internships and fellowships for African Designers and students
- g) Assist in connecting African designers with global markets by facilitating partnerships with international brands, retailers and distributors. This can help increase the visibility and commercial success of African-designed products.
- h) Encourage and fund research projects that explore the potential of design in addressing local and regional challenges. This can lead to innovative solutions and technologies that contribute to sustainable development.

- i) Support the establishment of monitoring and evaluation systems to track the progress and impact of PADDI initiatives to help identify areas for improvement and ensure resources are allocated effectively.

5. Pan African Design Development Initiative (PADDI) in context with Africa Agenda 2063

Africa Agenda 2063, also known as '*The Africa We Want*,' is a strategic framework adopted by the African Union in 2013. It outlines a developmental vision for the continent over a 39-year period, aiming to transform Africa into a global powerhouse through sustainable development and economic integration. The agenda is divided into various thematic areas, including socio-economic development. On the other hand, the Pan African Design Development Initiative (PADDI) is established to promote industrialization, job creation and economic growth, cultural identity and regional integration within Africa by fostering the growth of the creative and design industries. The initiative focuses on four key sectors: **fashion, furniture, art and creative design**. The Africa Agenda and the Initiative are interconnected through their shared objectives of promoting socio-economic development. While Agenda 2063 serves as an overarching strategic framework for the continent's development, PADDI specifically targets the creative and design industries as a means to contribute to Africa's economic growth and job creation.

Moreover, PADDI's initiatives in healthcare design and education align with Goal 3 (*Good Health and Well-being*) and Goal 4 (*Quality Education*) of the SDGs.

Both the SDGs and PADDI emphasize collaboration among various stakeholders to achieve their objectives. The SDGs recognize the importance of partnerships between Governments, civil society, private sector actors and international organizations in implementing sustainable development initiatives. Similarly, PADDI encourages collaboration between designers, policymakers, entrepreneurs, other partners and communities to co-create innovative solutions that address Africa's development challenges. By fostering partnerships and collective action, both frameworks seek to mobilize resources and expertise towards sustainable development outcomes.

7. Impact Pan African Design Development Initiative (PADDI) at a continental level
